Discussed differences of big academic medical centers w/ high levels of education compared to smaller hospitals/centers with less resources. Academic center partnerships may be easier to establish compared to rural centers, but large organizations could mentor small organizations. Definition of partnership vs. collaboration. Partnership implies mutual gain for both parties. How can we use collective (and scarce) resources to advance knowledge (whether EBP or research)? Intermittent collaboration versus no long-term collaboration. Do not drop the clinical setting once the data is collected, report results to site. MOU ("Memorandum of Understanding") b/w academic & clinical sites. Ex: Hospital donates staff nurse's time/work, university staff writes grants in exchange. Could share full-time equivalents (FTEs). New York perspective. Guest Monica Diamond-Carabella discussed her work with improving asthma health in the public health & school districts of NY. They have a 15-year partnership with <i>many</i> schools of nursing, so there is no competition. Partnership is based on mutual set goals and respect & sharing the same vision. Effective communication is key. Q from St. Louis: Does anyone have connections with the VA to conduct research? Access at the VA can be very challenging. Dr. Nancy Albert states she has some VA connections.

Nancy Albert provided an update of the cross-sectional, descriptive research study to assess academic clinical partnerships (for nursing research) in the U.S. The literature review indicated that most research was about education, not research. The survey underwent content validity index (CVI) review during development. The Cleveland Clinic IRB approved the IRB proposal. REDCap for survey distribution. Next step: Will request MNRS leadership to invite ALL MNRS members to participate. Please feel free to forward survey to colleagues outside of MNRS to complete. We'd like a variety of respondents, those with partnerships and some without. Survey is only 40 items, and is anonymous (no emails).
